MashinaniWORKS empowers historically marginalized youth and women of the communities of arid and semi-arid lands to improve their livelihoods with trade and commerce.

We work with communities to create sustainable, environmentally friendly local economies, help them earn diversified incomes that assist them to cope with the effects of climate change, alleviate poverty, and bring peace to natural-resource based conflicts.

We deliver lasting impact at the grass roots by addressing the most important needs:

- Bringing skills and business acumen to communities,
- Making market systems work
- Expanding and connecting local production to markets.

Our work with community conservancies in ASAL northern and coastal Kenya

Community conservancies:

- A conservation easement on communal land
- 43 member conservancies of the Northern Rangelands Trust, in 10 counties
- 63,000 Square km2 (size of W Virginia)
- 19 Indigenous communities
- Approx 600K people

- Incorporated in Kenya in Sep 2014



41% of the Earth's land surface
60% of Africa's surface
89% of Kenya's land mass

The Pastoralist livelihood in northern Kenya



Biodiversity conservation is inextricably linked with the changing pastoralist livelihood

Climate change

- Droughts and flooding decimate livestock and wildlife
 - USAID provided USD310 million in humanitarian assistance in Fiscal Year 2022 alone
- Human Wildlife Conflict (HWC), bushmeat trade and illegal charcoal during hard times

Population

- Pressure to convert land for agriculture
- Loss of habitat and severe degradation
- Conflict over livestock, water and pasture
- Low HDIs


For women and Youth of the ASALs, lifting themselves out of poverty is especially difficult

- Least economically integrated
- Remote harsh natural environment
- Climate related disasters
- Skills deficit
- Conflict over natural resources

We have chosen to focus on economic areas that can bring sustained climate change adaptation:

- Beaded handicraft
- Livestock sector
- Financial Inclusion
- Entrepreneurship
- Vocational Skills
- Tourism

Achieving resilience is a journey, not a single step



Beadworks Earned income for women from handicraft

1200 women have been earning yearly income since 2011 from our beaded handicraft business.

Unique 'Starbeader' production system that creates local leaders

USD 2.3 million in cumulative sales

USD 900K in cumulative income earned by the women.



Financial Inclusion

Savings and credit at the village level

5,600 enrolled into a communityowned Savings and Credit Cooperative (SACCO).

• Over 69% are women

USD 1.3m loaned out.

- Initial loans of USD 250
- 55% repayment rate
- Over 700 have 'graduated' into larger loan amounts (USD 400-1000).

USD 300K in collective savings

<u>'Biashara Mashinani' Entrepreneurship Development</u> Creating entrepreneurs and employers at the villages

400 'Star' entrepreneurs supported through coaching and mentorship, and specialized context-specific modular curriculum.

Improvement in revenue from USD 51 to USD 166 per month (over 3x increase).



<u>'Ujuzi Manyattani'</u> Vocations that diversify livelihoods

782 women and youth graduated into vocations that earn immediate income.

Graduates earning USD 80 per month.

Initiated partnership with government.

<u>'Ufugaji Bora Mashinani' Livestock school</u> Enhanced knowledge for productivity and resilience

300 livestock keepers benefitting from a specialized modular curriculum created with government.

Improvements in fodder planning, animal health decision making, breed selection.

10 Livestock Marketing Associations created at the Conservancies (50% under female leadership)

Community-owned Tourism


- 4 Community-owned tourism 'banda' operations launched and supported.
- 1 high-end lodge
- USD 510,000 in income to conservancies (2022)
- 88 Conservancy Board members trained
- 23 youth trained in hospitality.

Investor-led Tourism

- 5 High-end lodges.
- USD 750,000 in income to conservancies (2022).




